


JIGSAW INSTRUCTIONS

My students used to call this "the impossible puzzle". It is very challenging to get ALL of the pieces in the correct places.

- 1. Have students work with the person with whom they share a desk. You can move kids around if there are empty seats. There can be one group of three if there is an odd number of students.
- 2. Give one copy of the puzzle and a pair of scissors to each pair of students. Scissors are in the left-side, middle desk drawer in a Steve Madden shoe box.
- Instruct students to cut apart the puzzle pieces. They do not need to cut on every single line; this would take forever. Just chop apart the paper into the twelve boxes. It doesn't have to be pretty; just make sure they don't cut through any text.
- 4. Students must work to solve the puzzle by putting it into a 3X4 grid that matches the solution. The solution is not the same as how the pieces were printed on the students' page, so let them know that they can't just match up the lines that they cut and put it back together that way.
- 5. They fit pieces together by finding the start of a sentence (clue: capital letter in front) and then locating the second half of that sentence on another piece (clue: ends in a period). The first and second halves of a sentence should be placed next to each other, like this (the sentences are "Spanish is/awesome", Mrs. Bex is/the best teacher.", "alaska is/a big state", and "frogs are/green"):
- 6. When the puzzle is solved correctly, the numbers written in the centers of the squares do NOT all go in the same direction; they are numbered just to make it easier for YOU to check the solution. The text along the perimeter of the puzzle does not match anything (they are duplicates of phrases in the puzzle so that it is trickier to solve).
- 7. If a student thinks that s/he solves it, check the answer. If it is wrong, tell them which pieces are matched incorrectly. If it is correct, have them write out each sentence on a separate piece of paper and write down its translation in English beside it.







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
